Special Guest: Gabriela Diéguez Hurato

abriela Diéguez Hurato, LCSW earned her Masters in Social Work at University of Wisconsin Milwaukee. She has worked as a bilingual therapist for ten years at Sixteenth Street Community Health Center providing services to the inner city population in Milwaukee. Most of the people that she serves are Latinos with incomes below the poverty level. She works with individuals and families who come with diverse mental health needs including anxiety, depression and behavioral problems in their children.

Gabriela has collaborated in several research projects, with the University of Wisconsin Milwaukee on Behavioral Activation for Latinos, and with Marquette University on Attention Deficit Disorders in Latino Children.

She is an active member of the Milwaukee Latino Health Coalition, a group of professionals from different organizations.



The Coalition's vision is to increase the health and well-being of Latino communities by organizing power for social change.

Mrs. Diéguez Hurato is currently the chair of the Mental Health Action Team which works on advocacy, education and resource building for mental health.

Gabriela states that she pursued the career of social worker because she loves to relate to people as they go through their process of growth, discovering their strengths and amplifying their community connections.

## This year's organization receiving our toiletries is Fresh Start Learning, Inc.


