he tradition of honoring students who have achieved academic success, have volunteered within their school and community, and are eager to begin a new chapter in their life pursuing a higher education degree continues on Saturday, May 7, at the annual Scholarship Awards Brunch, held at the Italian Conference Center.

The selection committee meets at the end of April to determine the recipients and the amount of each award. In recent years those awards have been between \$4,000—\$6,000 each. Presently there are 35 applications from 11 Milwaukee Public High Schools throughout the city

High School counselors are integral in the application process as each application must come through the counselor. In addition to the three-page application, students are asked to include a transcript, a personal statement regarding higher education plans and beyond, optional letters of recommendation, and proof of financial need.

The Selection Committee is very appreciative of the time that is devoted by the counselors, the students themselves and the cooperation of family in preparing the application. Each application is studied and evaluated thoroughly. As these students are ALL outstanding, it is not an easy job to select the final recipients.

Equal Pay Day

We marked Equal Pay Day (the day when women's pay will symbolically "catch up" to what men were paid in 2015) at Alverno and UWM campuses on April 12th to raise awareness of pay discrimination. The Milwaukee Branch thanks Michelle Prosek, Kathe Bogdan, Charity Blount, Bev Katter, Lyn Hildenbrand, Shirley Metcalf and Sharon Munson for volunteering their time in this effort.

Three years ago Mary Fiedler met with State Sen. Chris Larson on AAUW Legislative Day to educate him on our issues. Every year since he had written about Equal Pay Day in the newsletter to his constituents.

You can also help by asking our senators to vote **no** on cloture (the process of closing debate in the Senate by calling for a vote) when the "Workplace Advancement Act, SB2200, comes to a vote. According to AAUW, this is a misguided reform attempt that will do more harm than good.

President's Nominee

Equally important is the need to urge our senators to vote on the President's nomination of Judge Merrick Garland for the U.S. Supreme Court Justice vacancy. The senators should provide advice and consent as the constitution requires. Ten months is too long to allow a court vacancy in this important deliberative body.

Burial Reject

The Woman Airforce Service Pilots (WASPs) who served with distinction in World War II and have earned Congressional Gold Medals are not permitted burial in Arlington National Cemetery. Sen. Barbara Milkulski and Reps. Susan Davis, Martha McSally and Joni Ernst are trying to rectify this slight with SB 2437 and HR 4336.



May 24: The Invention of Wings by Sue Monk Kidd. Anne Bales Discussion—Leader.

The Invention of Wings, a powerful and sweeping historical novel by Sue Monk Kidd, begins, fittingly, with an image of flight: Hetty "Handful", who has grown up as a slave in early nineteenth century Charleston, recalls the night her mother told her that her ancestors in Africa could fly over trees and clouds. That day, Handful's mother, Charlotte, gave her daughter the gift of hope— the possibility that someday she might regain her wings and fly to freedom. Throughout Kidd's exquisitely written story, Handful struggles, sometimes with quiet dissidence, sometimes with open rebellion, to cultivate a belief in the invincibility of her spirit and in the sacred truth that one does not need actual wings in order to rise.
